Drive Perth to Margaret River (Yallingup - Cape Lodge) 255 kms/159 miles (3 hours non-stop driving time)

Fremantle has long been renowned for its eclectic mix of arty and alternative types. Fremantle's streets buzz with the song of buskers, the sidewalks fill with a wild collection of art and music floats out from trendy cafes and bars. Enjoy a coffee along the 'Cappuccino Strip' or trendy Wray Avenue, South Terrace and High Street. Enjoy fish and chips at the Fishing Boat Harbour and stroll along the boardwalk to Bathers Beach. Visit the Fremantle Markets, Fremantle Fishing Boat Harbour, WA Maritime Museum, and Fremantle Prison.

If time permits, stop in Mandurah, the gateway to the many other attractions of the hinterland including Pinjarra; home of the Hotham Valley Tourist Railway which offers scenic Steam Train excursions throughout the State; and the vast timber forests of the Darling Scarp. Many Western Australians and regular visitors from around the world have built luxury holiday and retirement homes along the waterways and in the modern residential canal developments. Regular boat cruises of the waterways depart daily from the dock adjacent to the Mandurah Tourist Bureau. Watch bottlenose dolphins playing joyfully in the canals, estuary and rivers.

Stop in Bunbury, well known for its pristine beaches it is a popular holiday spot for Western Australians and offers the visitor a wide range of local tours, cruises and special events. Numerous wildlife parks, art galleries and holiday attractions provide plenty of things to do and for the more active you can swim with the dolphins (November-April) off Koombana beach most mornings. Take a stroll around the streets to spot the street murals (pick up a map from the local visitor centre). There are plenty of cafes and boutiques along the way if you need a rest! Travel along the Bussell Highway (State Route 10) to Margaret River.

Stop at Busselton, Western Australia's premier seaside resort town and holiday mecca with golden beaches, crystal clear waters and abundant water based activities to take part in. Visit the old wooden Busselton Jetty, almost 2 kms in length. The first stage was built in 1865 and further extensions were made until 1965. Abandoned by the government in 1972 and damaged by fire and cyclones through the years, the jetty is now cared for by a local Jetty Preservation Society and provides a pleasant place to take a stroll, enjoy the fresh clean air, relax, or just dangle a fishing line in the water and hope that no fish come along to disturb your reverie. The Busselton Jetty Underwater Observatory is one of Western

Australia's must-see eco-tourism attractions. Located near the end of the jetty, the Underwater Observatory enables you to view more than 300 species of marine life from the underwater chamber windows 8 metre below sea level.

If time permits, explore Yallingup with its stunning coastline, including Cape Naturaliste Lighthouse and Ngilgi Cave. The Margaret River region stretches from Busselton to Augusta. The area has spectacular beaches, exquisite caves, adventurous walks and trails, world class surfing spots, divine cuisine and award winning wine.

Continue along the Bussell Highway, turning right onto Wildwood Road, then turn left onto Abbey's Farm Road and left onto Caves Road to Cape Lodge. Spend a day of exploring the fantastic wineries and food producers of the region including Vasse Felix and Sandalford Wines. Stop at the Margaret River Chocolate Factory, sample wines, olive oils and fresh produce at Margaret River Providore, taste feta at the Margaret River Dairy Company or buy a take home meal from The Larder. Take a drive to Prevelly, home of the Margaret River Pro surfing titles, or stop at Leeuwin Estate and the Margaret River Fudge Factory.

If time permits, explore Yallingup with its stunning coastline, including Cape Naturaliste Lighthouse and Ngilgi Cave. The Margaret River region stretches from Busselton to Augusta. The area has spectacular beaches, exquisite caves, adventurous walks and trails, world class surfing spots, divine cuisine and award winning wine.

Stop at Busselton, Western Australia's premier seaside resort town and holiday mecca with golden beaches, crystal clear waters and abundant water based activities to take part in. Visit the old wooden Busselton Jetty, almost 2 kms in length. The first stage was built in 1865 and further extensions were made until 1965. Or join one of the adventure boats on a sightseeing expedition to Whirlpool Pass, an aptly named further demonstration of the Kimberley's powerful tides. Before you know it, your first day onboard will be coming to an end – but there's still time to select a fi ne wine and to enjoy a leisurely evening meal as we cruise to Doubtful Bay.

Day 10

This morning is devoted to exploring the Sale River. Join naturalists and adventurers alike as we 'ride the tide' on a classic river expedition! For those who can't wait one minute longer, the mouth of the Sale offers the first opportunity to 'land a barra'! Or, take-off for a heli-fishing adventure (additional cost) to a rarely fished spot where the fresh meets the salt! Enjoy lunch as we weigh anchor and cruise for another Kimberley icon – Montgomery Reef! Montgomery is a unique ecosystem that must be seen to be believed – and see it you will – as 140 square miles of coral reef rises out of the ocean right before your very eyes! Water cascades from the reef as the tide falls exposing a privileged glimpse of another world! Turtles, dugong, crocodiles and every imaginable sea creature abound and the helicopter (additional cost) puts all in perspective!

Day 11

The scenery will astound and there are some not-to-be-missed fishing spots as the TRUE NORTH graces the majestic Prince Regent River. This morning's target species include delectable mangrove jack and fingermark bream. At King Cascade we will manoeuvre the TRUE NORTH right under the falls. Then it's time for more 'adventure in the tender' – a chance to stretch the laces on your hiking boots and an

opportunity to swim in yet another picture perfect billabong, or perhaps you'd like to venture further upriver to visit the spectacular 'Amphitheatre' waterfall. The helicopter (additional cost) will be popular again when the first group of intrepid explorers returns from Jurassic Park!

Day 12

If you think the Regent was good – wait till you see the Hunter! With stunning red cliff s set behind rainforest and mangroves - the Hunter River is yet another awesome setting for fishing, mud crabbing, bird watching and just simply exploring! Vansittart Bay also has a reputation for producing monster mackerel! The heli-picnic (additional cost) at Eagle Falls is always a 'big hit' – enjoy a sumptuous picnic lunch amidst breathtaking scenery. The tenders will also be busy exploring the local beaches and creeks. Overnight we cruise to Koolama Bay.

Day 14

Yet another mighty Kimberley river – The King George! As soon as the tide is high enough, we'll cross the sand bars at the mouth to reveal even more breathtaking river vista. Then our journey upstream will take us to the very 'jewel in the crown' – The King George Falls. Here we anchor at the base of the Twin Falls and you will find endless places to explore. Take the helicopter (additional cost) to the top of the falls for another highlight. Just the thought of leaving this magnificence will inspire mutiny! Learn about the bombing of a state-ship during WWII, then take a stroll at Tranquil Bay before we continue onto the frontier port of Wyndham.

Day 15

Business Hours

General retail trading hours throughout Australia are Monday to Friday 9.00am – 5.00pm. Saturday is either 9.00am - 12 noon or through to 5.00pm. Sunday shopping is available in most city centres and suburban malls. Please check with your Hotel Concierge for local information on trading hours.

Currency

The Australian dollar is the basic unit, divided into 100 cents; coins are 5c, 10c, 20c, 50c, \$1, \$2 and notes are \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100. Due to the discontinuation of 1c, 2c pieces, purchases made in Australia are subject to "rounding" of amounts either up or down. Most retailers have adopted the 'Swedish Rounding System' whereby prices ending in 1 to 4 cents will be rounded down and prices ending in 6 to 9 cents will be rounded up.

Banking/Travellers' Cheques

Banks open Monday-Friday (except public holidays), 9.30am-4.30pm. Automatic teller machines operate on a card/PIN number system. Cash can be withdrawn 24 hours a day. Use of EFTPOS (Electronic Funds Transfer at Point of Sale) is common. All international credit cards (American Express, Diners, VISA, and MasterCard) are accepted. Travellers' cheques may be changed at banks and hotels.

Goods & Services Tax (GST)

Goods and Services are taxed 10%. This tax is usually included in the advertised price.

Tipping Guidelines

In Australia tipping is generally not customary and is only exercised as a genuine thank you for receiving great service. There is no obligation to tip, although the practice is common within the restaurant and tourism transport industries.

Tips for good service:

- 1. Restaurants, a tip of about 10% is generally sufficient for good service with 15% for exceptional service.
- 2. Luggage Porters AU\$2.00 per piece.
- 3. Coach drivers and guides receive for touring (not transfers) around the AU\$5.00 per person per day, however tips should not be given for average or below average service/driving or commentary.
- 4. Private Drivers for transfers should be only tipped for excellent service (around AU\$10-20 total). The same applies for touring with a Driver/Guide, with tips for excellent service being anywhere from AU\$40-100 depending on the level of service.
- 5. Small group touring should be only tipped for excellent service (around AU\$20 per person).

Electricity Supply

Australia's electrical current is 220/240 volts accepting 3-pin plugs. An adaptor can be used but it is important to note that they do not convert voltage. Universal outlets for 240v or 110v shavers are usually found in leading hotels.

Emergencies

Dial 000 for police, fire or ambulance services.

Telephone Local Area Codes

Australia uses 8-digit local phone numbers preceded by a 2-digit STD area code.

- 02 Central east region (NSW) New South Wales, (ACT) Australian Capital Territory
- 03 South east region (VIC) Victoria and (TAS) Tasmania
- 04 Mobile telephones Australia-wide
- 07 North east region (QLD) Queensland
- 08 Central and west region (WA) Western Australia, (SA) South Australia and (NT) Northern Territory

For example, if you are calling Canberra in the ACT from interstate, first dial the STD area code 02, then dial the local phone number.

Health Services

Public and private health facilities have a high standard of treatment and care. Larger hotels often have a local doctor on call; otherwise, doctors and other medical services are listed in the front of the local telephone directory.

Pharmaceuticals and Medicines

These are available from chemists/pharmacies during normal shopping hours. Most cities have urgent dispensaries open outside these hours and your Hotel Concierge will have a list of these. Chemists also sell cosmetics, insect repellent and sun protections.

Climate

The southern parts of Australia have four distinct seasons, the opposite of those in the northern hemisphere. When it is winter in Europe and North America, it is summer in Australia. You will hardly see snow, apart from the mountainous regions in eastern Victoria and southern New South Wales. Australia's north is in the tropics which has two seasons, the dry and the wet; both have

high temperatures year round. The centre has a typical desert climate, hot days and cool , which can be very cold in winter.

Sun Protection

Due to Australia's high level of ultraviolet radiation it is highly advisable to wear sun protection such as sunglasses and/or a sun hat and to apply sunblock (SPF 30+) even when the day is overcast.

Water Supply

Tap (faucet) water is safe to drink. City water is chlorinated; most water is fluoridated. Water sourced from rivers and lakes should be boiled or treated before drinking.

Time Differences, Time Zones and Daylight Saving

Australia's East Coast is 10 hours ahead of GMT (Greenwich Mean Time) during the months of April to September (Standard Time) each year. With a land mass close to 7.7 million square kilometres, Australia is the world's sixth largest country and during Standard Time it is divided into three separate time zones.

Time Zones:

Australian Eastern Standard Time (AEST)

Covers the eastern states of Queensland, New South Wales (with the exception of the town of Broken Hill), Victoria, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory.

AEST is equal to Coordinated Universal Time plus 10 hours (UTC +10).

Australian Central Standard Time (ACST)

Covers the state of South Australia, the town of Broken Hill in western New South Wales and the Northern Territory. ACST is equal to Coordinated Universal Time plus 9.5 hours (UTC +9.5).

Australian Western Standard Time (AWST)

Covers Western Australia.

AWST is equal to Coordinated Universal Time plus 8 hours (UTC +8).

Daylight Saving:

Daylight Saving Time (DST) is the practice of advancing clocks one hour during the warmer months of the year. In Australia, Daylight saving is observed in New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory.

Daylight Saving Time begins at 2.00am on the first Sunday in October, when clocks are put forward one hour. It ends at 2.00am (which is 3.00am Daylight Saving Time) on the first Sunday in April, when clocks are put back one hour.
